Paul saw it in terms of a race whose finish line was heaven and for which he was willing to spend his last ounce of energy.


Peter saw that once he acknowledged who Jesus was, he had no choice but to proclaim the truth of his heart. He knew Jesus was the Messiah because he saw it in the look of those who were healed, fed, and restored at Christ's hand.

He experienced it in the love Christ gave him even after he denied him. He saw it in the faces of those he healed in Christ's name and who eagerly came to baptism and the outpouring of the Spirit.

What is it like now? How do we know Jesus is the Messiah in our hearts? And how has that made a

difference in our lives? Is this relationship so unlike any other that we are willing to be poured out, to spend our energy, to proclaim the Good News even though it may seem foolish?

That's an uncomfortable question for many Catholics. For many of us, religion and faith are private matters, and sometimes that helps us avoid

From Father Khoa's Desk...

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

This weekend we celebrate the solemn feast of Saints Peter and Paul. This solemnity celebrates two pillars of our faith: Peter, apostle to the Jews, and Paul, apostle to the Gentiles. But this solemnity celebrates more than two great apostles. Peter and Paul represent all believers who come to faith and acknowledge who Christ is, and who keep the faith by fulfilling their part in the mission of Jesus. This solemnity celebrates the establishment of the church. Most of all, this solemnity celebrates the victory of Christ that is shared with his faithful disciples.

Each of these two saints is important for different reasons. Peter is important because he was the first Pope and kept the church united which was growing very rapidly in the years following Pentecost. In the first years after Pentecost it was Jews who accepted Jesus as the Savior and so the early church was a very Jewish church. But as time went on Paul began to preach also to non-Jews, the Gentiles as they were called. All of us are Gentiles. His preaching was very successful and he brought huge numbers of non- Jews into the church, so much so that the number of Jews in the church was greatly outnumbered by non-Jews. It is because of Paul that we are now in the Church. So both Peter and Paul had very important tasks in the early church, Peter maintaining the unity in the church which during his lifetime had already spread throughout the Middle East and Europe, and Paul who taught the Jews that Jesus is the fulfillment of their Old Testament hopes and taught the non-Jews that Jesus is the Savior. Whenever you see statues of Peter and usually Peter is holding symbolizing his duty as head of the church, and

Paul is holding the Bible, symbolizing his preaching.

These two extraordinary shepherds, laboring for our Redeemer and Lord, have "set the bar very high" for all of us as we contemplate what more might The Lord be asking of me in the building of The Kingdom during the time with which He has blessed me here. Hope your summer is going well. Have a great week and may God bless all of us!
