# Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

I made a retreat on the shores of Massachusetts not long ago. The shore was rocky, with slabs of granite meeting the ocean. The air was fragrant with flowers and foliage in late August. Birds, bees, and crickets went about their daily business. *Surely God is here*, I thought as I immersed myself in nature, silence, and prayer. I took a piece of granite from the shore to remind myself of my retreat.

It might seem odd to have a feast day for a church, but our readings today show us that marking God's presence is a time-honored tradition.

When Jacob dreamed of ladders and angels, he took it as a sign of God's presence and built an altar in the place he'd slept.

When Zacchaeus heard Jesus call his name, he climbed down from the tree to welcome Jesus into his home and was moved then and there to give back anything he owed and more.

When we finally recognize the presence of God, we often take special note of the moment with some sign. The sign can be small, like my rock. But in other times, people have built extraordinary places of worship, painted luminous pictures, or sculpted statues of amazing grace.

The Basilica of St. John Lateran, the principal cathedral of Rome (also known as the pope's cathedral) and the baptismal Church of ancient Rome, is a wonderful example of such a sign.

Our focus today is not on the building itself, but on what it represents – the union of the whole people of God gathered with the pope in witness to the presence of God.

## **From Father Khoa's Desk...**

### ***Dear Parishioners and Friends,***

Most Catholics think of Saint Peter's Basilica as the Church of the Bishop on the Chair of Saint Peter in Rome, but they are incorrect! Saint John Lateran is the Church of The Holy Father, successor of Saint Peter The Apostle. The Lateran Basilica is the Cathedral of the Diocese of Rome where the bishop of Rome presides in the same way that the mother church of our Diocese of Biloxi is The Cathedral of Nativity of the Bless Virgin Maria and is where our diocesan bishop, Bishop Morin presides.

In today Gospel, Jesus predicted his resurrection. But it wasn't until after the disciples witnessed the miraculous event that they realized what he had been talking about. At the time, Jesus' words seemed mysterious, even confusing. Those who heard him understandably thought his reference to "this temple" was about the Jewish house of worship. But it wasn't. He was talking about his body. This only became clear later. As the saying goes, "hindsight is twenty-twenty." How often do we find ourselves in the midst of a situation that doesn't make sense at the time? We question the "meaning" of a sickness, a lost job, a betrayal, or a disappointment. But then, after time has passed, we can begin to see it from another angle.

In fact, many times we begin to see how good came out of these tough situations. St. Paul says, "We know that all things work for good for those who love God," (Rom 8:28). Sometimes it's hard to trust in God's promises, especially when his plan seems mysterious or confusing. But just as the disciples learned that Jesus knew what he was talking about, we can believe that too. He tells us that he is "the way and the truth and the life" (Jn 14:6). Although the way may seem indirect, Jesus' perspective is bigger than ours. He knows how to

lead us to the fullness of life, in this world and the next. The path may not be one that we would choose. Even Jesus had to journey through the cross before his resurrection-the temple of his body was destroyed before it was rebuilt. But looking back, it's obvious that God's plans really do work out for the best.
