On a once-in-a-lifetime trip to Spain, my husband and I were privileged to witness a Corpus Christi procession near Barcelona that wound its way from the church through the streets and back to the church. At the head of the procession was a large ornate monstrance with a consecrated host inside held aloft on a platform carried by some of the priests assisted by others. Following behind was another priest incensing the monstrance and then the various church groups beginning with the children and including what I imagine were orders like the Knights of Columbus or the Solidarity of Mary. The mood was not solemn, but celebratory. Flowers marked the path and the participants. In a tradition dating back to the sixteenth century, an egg was dancing on the water spout in the church fountain. We were enchanted.

I do remember processions around my church—though never through the town—when I was a child, but they were solemn affairs and did not resemble the celebration we witnessed. What captured my imagination in Spain was the absolute joy on the faces of those processing. I remember the singing and the laughter and wonder, “What better response could we give to the Lord who gives himself to us in the Eucharist?”

Whether we process or not, whether we are in prayer before the tabernacle or monstrance or just going about our day, let us project the joy that comes from knowing the Lord and encountering him under the appearances of bread and wine which have become the Body and Blood of Christ.

## **From Father Khoa's Desk...**

### ***Dear Parishioners and Friends,***

The documents of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council, when writing about the Eucharist, describe it as the source and summit of all Christian spirituality. There are a series of official liturgical prayers in the church every day of which morning and evening prayer are the two pillars of prayer during any given day. The high point of all the liturgical prayers in any day is the celebration of the Eucharist, i.e. Mass.

St. Paul speaks of this Tradition with a capital 'T' in the second reading of today when he says, "Brothers and sisters: I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you," and then goes on to describe the Eucharist. The words St. Paul uses for, "...handed on to you,..." gives us a clear indication that what he is 'handing on' is the Tradition, the living Truth which continues in the Body of Christ, the Church. Our reception of Holy Communion at Mass is a culmination of everything we hold and teach in the Catholic Church, and when we receive Christ himself in the Body and Blood we enter into a public and full communion with Christ and his Church. When we say 'Amen' at the time of receiving communion we are saying that we believe and hold true to everything the Catholic Church teaches to be revealed by God to us his people. Our reception of baptism and confirmation is a public sign and statement that we hold true to and will live out all the teachings of the Church.

This is one of the reasons the Catholic Church discourages intercommunion, i.e. receiving communion in a denomination other than our own profession of faith. A Catholic ought not to be receiving communion in a different Christian faith group which is not

in full communion with the Roman Catholic Church, nor should a Christian who is not Catholic be receiving communion in the Catholic Church. This is a sad reality of the separation of teaching and doctrine of the various Christian communities.

Let us pray on this Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ for a return to and a union in communion of all Christians into one body, one faith and one baptism, and one God and Father of us all.

We celebrate **Memorial Day** on the civil calendar this Monday, when we as a nation, rightly pause and remember those who have given their lives to protect the many freedoms that we enjoy in our country. Let us especially remember those of our church parish who are actively serving our country around the world.
