Dear Padre,

If I'm late for Mass, can I receive the Eucharist?

There is no hard-and-fast rule on how "late" one can be for Mass and still receive Communion. Holy Communion is offered outside of Mass at times, so theoretically you could come during the Communion rite and still receive Communion.

But there is more to be considered with this question. If you are going to go Mass, you should be there from the beginning to the end. You should be there before the entrance procession begins and you should stay until the last verse of the final song is sung. Things happen, like an unexpected train on the way to Mass or a sick child who needs attention and care. However, if you find yourself always coming late to Mass, you may need to make a change in your routine.

I remember cleaning out a closet of a church I was stationed at, and I found a sign with ropes attached to it. It stated, "Mass has begun, the next Mass begins at..." and there was a place where you could list the time of the next Mass. I was told the ropes were tied across the entrance so you couldn't come into Mass late.

Those days are gone, though. It's up to you to follow your conscience. It is important to participate in the entire celebration, but if on the rare occasion

you come late to Mass, ask yourself, "Can I prepare myself to worthily receive Communion at this moment?" If you can answer "yes" to that question, then I would say it would be OK to receive Communion.



From Father Khoa's Desk...

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

The Scripture this Sunday instruct us about one of the most difficult dilemmas facing Christians living in a world filled with voices contrary to the Gospel. It is the challenge of dealing with the **problem of evil** in our lives. The struggle involves every generation and every culture and many books have been written under the general heading of "why do bad things happen to good people?" Most of us grow up with the moral understanding that the good should be rewarded and the evil should be punished. However, when we look around us at the world, the weeds seem to be doing better than the wheat and no one seems to be able to change the situation. Through the parable about the weeds growing among the wheat Jesus addresses the problem of evil from the perspective of God's creation. He speaks of the necessary tension between good and evil in our world and the fact that both can exist side by side in a divinely created universe. Why is this so? Because it lies within the essence of God's mystery of creation. The tension between good and evil is not yet resolved because creation itself is not yet finished. While we speak of God as having created the world, it is perhaps better to say that God is continuously creating a good world and wants us to be very involved in the process of creation. In other words, God has given us an important role in bringing about the fullness and dignity of all creation.

The moral challenge for Christians is to learn to live responsibly in a world that is very often unjust, unloving, and just plain evil. And today's Gospel passage is very insistent on the teaching that God is the author of not only creation but the final justice that everyone

will enjoy in the end. God will bring to perfection what he has begun. So while it is not up to us to eradicate evil from the world, we do have an important part to play in terms of being witnesses of God's design for all creation. However, we must accept this role with a good deal of humility and with careful study and prayer. The Gospel today gently but firmly reminds us of God's plan for all creation. If we can learn to cooperate with this plan, we will discover real joy in helping to bring about the kingdom where the final justice of God will dwell for all to experience.

May God bless all of us!
