Dear Padre,

When and where did perpetual adoration develop?

Adoration of the Eucharist can be traced to the early centuries of Christianity, but the practice of perpetually adoring the Eucharist began most clearly in Europe after the Council of Trent (1545–1563).

An Austrian community of cloistered Benedictine nuns took vows of perpetual adoration in the seventeenth century. As the number of cloistered communities dedicated to perpetual adoration grew, the need arose to bring this devotion to the laity. By the nineteenth century, various practices of adoration of the Eucharist were established.

By the mid-nineteenth century, French Saint Pierre-Julien Eymard started the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament for men to instill in the lay faithful the desire to honor and worship Christ in the Eucharist. Saint Pierre-Julien built churches dedicated to perpetual adoration and inspired many to make a holy hour in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament.

By the mid-twentieth century, the practice of perpetual adoration began to fade. With the renewal of the liturgy and the accent on the baptismal priesthood's role of justice in the modern world, many types of devotions waned, including devotion to visiting the Blessed Sacrament.

Saint John Paul II, however, revised the practice of perpetual adoration, and today parishes throughout the United States have special chapels in which parishioners are encouraged to spend at least one hour a week in adoration. Pious societies promote perpetual adoration as a way of giving praise and thanks to Christ.

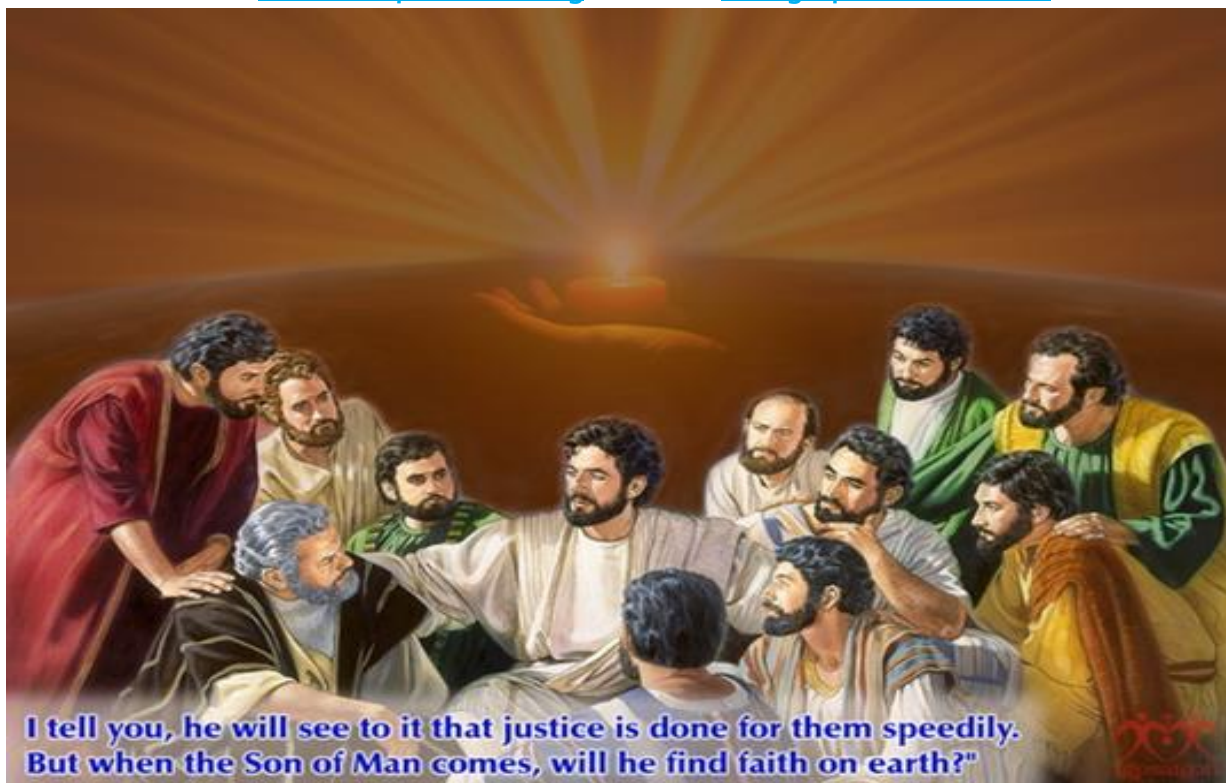

From Father Khoa's Desk...

***Dear Parishioners and Friends, Jesus likes you.
Jesus loves you. Jesus longs for you!***

In this weekend's Old Testament passage from the Book of Exodus, as long as Moses held his arms up in faith and hope, the armies of Israel prevailed against their enemies in battle. But when their leader lost his strength and confidence, the battle went against them. St Paul reminded Timothy in his letter that he could draw strength from several sources...from the teachers who taught him, from the scriptures which enlightened him, and most of all from the Christ who saved him.

In gospel today, the woman who persisted in her lawsuit until she was able to get justice is the heroine of this story. That woman's never-say-die attitude is the very essence of faith. Having a hopeful attitude often makes the difference on the athletic field. Talent and skill are indispensable. Equipment and training are necessary. But the difference between winning and losing often comes down to a matter of believing that you can win. Hope is no less important in the game of life. Hope is often the difference between success and failure. We know that one of the causes of failure is giving up too soon. People who lose the will to win soon make a habit of failure. People who lose the will to live have already begun to die. The point of gospel parable we hear this weekend speaks to the importance of persistence. Jesus knew that many who followed him would fall away when serious obstacles arose. This woman's persistence is praised as a model for disciples.
